ABSTRACT

Through Bayou Bend school tours, they discovered that almost all students – no matter what grade level from elementary through college, or how outstanding the school – knew almost nothing about the founding of the country, its heroes, or the principles upon which the government is built. But they also discovered these students were eager to learn.

Teachers said there was no way to teach these matters well in the time available with the materials they had. When Donna and Jan saw that their own children were also being affected, and then discovered that across the country there was no solution, they put aside their other professions and began.

In response to educators' frustration with lack of any effective way to instill good citizenship and teach American history in the time available, the Why America Is Free Curriculum was created. Integrated across all subjects, this innovative, hands-on approach meets or exceeds all state standards as it brings to life the extraordinary events, times, issues, and heroes of the founding period in an intense immersion for upper elementary students. It does so in a way that expands minds, generates respect, strengthens character, and unifies students as Americans. While igniting their intellectual excitement and imaginations, this curriculum also gives students the crucial decision-making skills, civic principles, and awareness of ownership responsibilities necessary for them to evolve into responsible citizens.

The developers of the curriculum now used with outstanding success in 12 states, Donna Passmore and Jan Smulcer, will speak about the national need, the hurdles to solution, new bipartisan legislation, and show how the curriculum serves as an essential element in that solution.
