ABSTRACT

Historians delve into the archive, bringing the past to life through largely narrative techniques and argumentative strategies. In essence, the historian is, among other things, a story-teller. But what might a poet do in the archive? In this presentation Joseph Campana will read from and discuss his forthcoming collection of poems, The Book of Life, which draws on the iconic Life magazine

for structure and inspiration by using poetic techniques to reactivate an ecstatic experience of the past and to immerse the reader in the process by which events become history.

Joseph Campana is a poet, scholar, and arts critic. He is the author of The Pain of Reformation: Spenser, Suffering and the Ethics of Masculinity and dozens of essays on Renaissance literature and theater. He has published three volumes of poetry: The Book of Faces, Natural Selections, which won the Iowa Poetry Prize, and the forthcoming The Book of Life. His poems appear in Poetry, Slate,

Conjunctions, Michigan Quarterly Review, and many other venues. He has received grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Breadloaf Witers' Conference, and the Houston Arts Alliance. His arts writing appears in Houston Chronicle, CultureMap, Kenyon Review, and elsewhere. He is Alan Dugald McKillop Associate Professor in the Department of English at Rice University.
